INFORMATION

Normanton is a small town on the Norman River in North Queensland's Gulf Savannah. Nearby **Karumba** is a fishing village and port. The region supports grazing, mining, fishing and tourism. Main access roads are bitumen but the area is low lying and can be isolated by floods Dec-March. But after the Wet Season is a good time to view waterbirds in the wetland zone between Normanton and Karumba, including Sarus Cranes with young.

Sarus Cranes spend the dry season feeding on the Atherton Tablelands but return to the gulf area to breed in Summer. Some Cranes and Brolgas may stay all year.

Sought-after species in mangroves and swampy grasslands include White-breasted Whistler, Zitting Cisticola, Arafura Fantail, Mangrove Robin and Yellow–White-eye. Mangrove Golden Whistler is occasionally spotted by the lucky visitor. Boat tours at Karumba specialise in mangrove bird species as well as Saltwater Crocodiles and spectacular sunsets.
